What Is a CBCT Scan?

A CBCT scan is a specialized type of dental imaging that takes multiple X-ray images from different angles and combines them into a three-dimensional view. The scan is quick, painless, and typically takes less than a minute.

Why Is a CBCT Scan Used in Endodontics?

Endodontics focuses on diagnosing and treating problems inside the tooth, particularly the dental pulp and root canal system. A CBCT scan can provide valuable information that is not always visible on standard dental X-rays.

1. Detecting Hidden Infections

Some infections or abscesses may be difficult to see on conventional X-rays. A CBCT scan can reveal infections around the root tip or within the surrounding bone, allowing for earlier and more accurate diagnosis.

2. Finding Complex Root Canals

Many teeth have root canal systems that are more complicated than expected. Extra canals, unusually shaped canals, or curved roots can be difficult to identify with 2D imaging. A CBCT scan helps your endodontist locate and treat all of the canals, improving the chances of a successful root canal treatment.

3. Diagnosing Cracked Teeth

Tiny cracks can cause pain but may not appear on regular X-rays. While not every crack is directly visible on CBCT, the scan can often show indirect signs of a crack, such as bone loss or inflammation, helping your dentist make a more informed diagnosis.



4. Planning Root Canal Treatment

Before treatment, a CBCT scan allows your endodontist to:

- * Evaluate root anatomy.
- * Measure the length and curvature of roots.
- * Identify nearby nerves or sinuses.
- * Plan the safest and most effective approach.

5. Evaluating Previous Root Canal Treatment

If a tooth has already had a root canal but symptoms return, a CBCT scan can help identify:

- * Missed root canals.
- * Persistent infection.
- * Broken instruments.
- * Root fractures.
- * Areas where retreatment may be needed.

6. Assessing Dental Trauma

After an injury, a CBCT scan can detect root fractures, bone damage, or injuries that may not be visible with traditional X-rays.

Is a CBCT Scan Safe?

Yes. CBCT scans use X-rays, so there is a small amount of radiation exposure. However, the radiation dose is generally much lower than that of a medical CT scan. Your dentist will only recommend a CBCT scan when the additional information is expected to improve diagnosis or treatment planning. Modern equipment also allows the smallest appropriate scan area and the lowest practical radiation dose.



What Should You Expect?

During the scan:

- * You will stand while the scanner rotates around your head.
- * The scan is painless and usually takes 10 to 40 seconds.
- * No needles or special preparation are required.
- * You can typically return to your normal activities immediately afterward.

Usually, no special preparation is needed. You may be asked to remove glasses, jewellery, hearing aids, or removable dentures before the scan.
